- Different cultures have their own traditional breads.



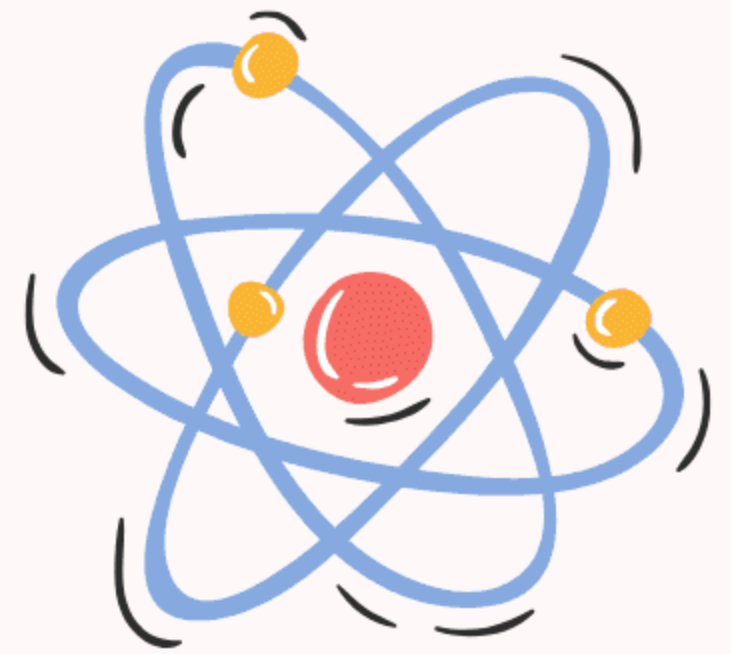
Fun Facts for Kids About Nature

- Forest floors are filled with organisms that recycle nutrients.

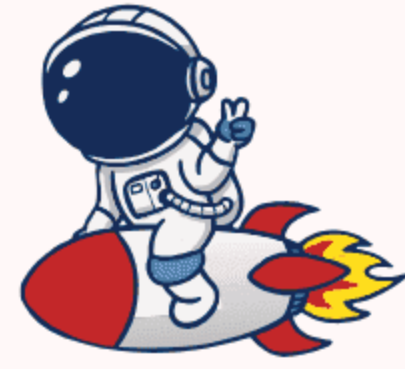


Fun Facts for Kids About Science
